

About the Mural

Spring Hill's new historical mural was made possible by the fundraising efforts of private citizens in cooperation with the Spring Hill Historical Society and Spring Hill Arts Council. The mural represents local artist Julie Macey's concept of our town at various stages throughout its history and features ideas submitted by local residents and students.

- 1 Celia Ann Dayton (1815-1895): First woman doctor in Kansas
- 2 Jeremiah McCanse (1847-1904): Former slave, civil war veteran, and respected community leader
- 3 Betty Corliss Smith (1912-2014): Beloved school teacher
- 4 Nathan Stiles (1992-2010): Student athlete and inspiration for The Nathan Project
- 5 The Davis family: Family who perished in the 1957 tornado
- 6 Ed Blair (1863-1950): Original town historian and poet
- 7 PVT Thomas E. Smith (1925-1944): World War II veteran
- 8 PFC Osborne C. Cole, Jr. (1921-1944): World War II veteran
- 9 Current City Park and the original town site with ghost buildings from yesteryear depicted
- 10 Spring Hill cemetery
- 11 1957 tornado
- 12 Spring Hill Baseball Fields, constructed in 1967
- 13 Civic Center/City Hall/Former School
- 14 Welcome to Spring Hill sign



- 15 AGC Glass Plant and City water tower
- 16 Life Spring Church and former Apple Market grocery store
- 17 USD 230 district offices
- 18 Spring Hill United Methodist Church; oldest town church still standing
- 19 Spring Hill Police Department/formerly the post office
- 20 The Old Jail: originally housed in a building across the street to the east, then at City Park, and moved back home in 2015
- 21 New Town: Old Town moved east starting in 1870 to be close to the railroad (The Grange Store is depicted as a ghost building where Spring Hill Oil is currently located)
- 22 Train Depot: No longer in existence (ghost building)
- 23 The Hideout: This location has long been operated as a social club
- 24 Spring Hill Farmer's Union Co-op
- 25 Spring Hill District Stadium
- 26 Blackhawk Development: representing commercial and residential development in recent years
- 27 The Dari-Anne, a former café
- 28 Old water tower (no longer in existence)
- 29 Spring Hill Community Center/Chamber of Commerce
- 30 Spring Hill Fire Department volunteer fire siren
- 31 Water tower
- 32 1915 "Spring Hill for Good Roads" protest
